This is the time in the Tech Trek (TT) calendar I call the holding pattern. It is the time between camps as well as fundraising, but that doesn't mean there is nothing to share.


We Can Do It!

AAUW Funds: Helping to Fund a Better Future for All Jackie DeFazio

November is traditionally the beginning of a season of giving as the holidays approach and appeals for end-of -year donations to nonprofit organizations begin to arrive in our mailboxes and inboxes. As you consider your response to AAUW's "ask," perhaps some additional information on our national organization's proud tradition of funding women's education and research will be helpful.



As mentioned in last month's newsletter, in 1920, members of AAUW, then known as the Association of Collegiate Alumnae (ACA), launched a campaign to raise \$100,000 as part of a larger effort led by American journalist Marie Meloney to purchase one gram of radium for scientist Marie Curie. In true AAUW fashion, ACA members exceeded their goal and actually raised \$156,413, for the fund, enabling Madame Curie to continue her research, which would eventually lead to her discovery of radiation as a treatment for cancer.

In May 1921, the ACA received a handwritten note on letterhead entitled "Faculte Des Sciences De Paris, Institut Du Radium, Laboratoire Curie," addressed to the treasurer, which read, "I ask you to thank the American Collegiate Alumnae and so accept for yourself the expression of my gratitude," signed Marie Curie.

After the gram of radium had been purchased, the remaining balance of \$53,000 was placed in a trust fund for Mme. Curie to be used during her lifetime. Curie went on to work with her daughter Irene, a professor of physics at the Sorbonne, who continued her mother's work after her death in 1934. Irene later returned a portion of the unused funds to AAUW, which used them to create the endowment that still funds the Marie Curie Post-Doctoral Fellowship.

Marie Curie became the first woman to receive a Nobel Prize and the only woman to receive two of them, one in physics, which she shared with her husband Pierre for their study of spontaneous radiation, and a second in chemistry in recognition of her work in radioactivity.

I don't know about you, but knowing that as a member of AAUW I stand on the shoulders of women like those in 1920 who worked to raise the funds for Mme. Curie so that she could continue research so pivotal to the advancement of science inspires me to contribute to AAUW Funds annually in the certain knowledge that women who receive our backing will continue to shape a better world.



Candidate Forum, October 9

A huge thank you to Kathy Cunningham and Jackie Olson for producing our traditional Candidate Forum on October 9. This year's event at Stanwood High School's Performing Arts Center was well received by our community and the candidates. Twenty-two candidates were invited, twelve were able to attend, and we filled the front section of

the large auditorium with seating for 600 people.


Candidates greeted the guests in the auditorium fover with flyers and posters. During the program each candidate participated in a nine minute presentation and answer period at the podium. Anne Milton was marvelous as the moderator asking questions that were submitted by guests and compiled by our branch members. Afterwards the candidates voiced their appreciation for AAUW sponsoring this opportunity for them to speak to their citizens.

DEI (Diversity, Equity and Inclusion) Spotlight Katie Farrey

ADHD (attention-deficit/hyperactivity disorder) is an umbrella term for several closely related experiences. People with ADHD *hyperactive-impulsive* type are often very active and make quick decisions. They may also have trouble focusing. People with ADHD *combined type* have traits from both of the first groups. The old view focused on challenges, such



as getting easily distracted or being extra energetic and often overlooked the cool aspects of ADHD, such as creativity and fast thinking. Whether ADHD is felt as a challenge or strength often depends on circumstances, understanding, and support. 
