I want to thank Martha Huyler and the nominating committee for working to fill vacancies on our board. In addition, thank you to all who have committed to serving. We would not be here without you.



AAUW Funds—Results of Working Together Jackie DeFazio



As promised in January, the information below is provided as additional evidence of what has been achieved through contributions to AAUW Funds by members across the country working together to support the work of our national organization. These contributions, says AAUW's Chief Executive Officer Gloria Blackwell, "are powering our unwavering commitment to equity for women and girls, making a meaningful difference across the country and the world."

In 2024, AAUW accomplished the following:

- Invested \$6.2 million in fellowships and grants, directly supporting 285 brilliant women pursuing their educational and career aspirations and breaking barriers in fields where they are underrepresented. Since 1888, AAUW has provided \$146 million to nearly 15,000 recipients from 152 countries.
- Equipped women with the tools to achieve economic empowerment through AAUW's Work Smart and Start Smart programs which empower women to negotiate better salaries, leading to a 44–62% increase in confidence for participants.
- Provided nonpartisan voter education resources in English and Spanish through AAUW's It's My Vote! campaign on issues including Title IX, reproductive rights, and paid leave and pay equity.
- Supported strengthened Title IX rules to provide better survivor-focused protections for people experiencing sexual assault or harassment and intended to make explicit Title IX's protections for pregnant, parenting, and LGBTQ+ students. (This rule was vacated by a district court in Jan. 2025.)
- Awarded 18 Community Action Grants to support U.S. organizations advancing gender equity for girls and women locally. Combined, grantees reported impacting over 5,620 women and girls.
- Sent 47,000 messages to elected officials via AAUW's Two Minute Activist.

Your contributions are just a few of the achievements YOU helped make possible in 2024: We invested \$6.2 million in fellowships. AAUW's Capitol Hill Lobby Corps visited more than 300 congressional offices. AAUW rebranded our *It's My Vote!* Campaign, fought for equal rights, and saw victories at the ballot box. Thanks to your support, AAUW members helped champion successful ballot initiatives that keep public money with public schools, support paid leave, and protect and expand access to reproductive care including abortion. Your impact is forging a stronger pathway for women and girls ensuring that AAUW's vital work continues for generations to come. Public Policy—Lobby Week Results Judy Prince

Lobby Week, held each year in January, is the week that includes Lobby Day and scheduled calls to our state legislators. The Lobby Day virtual meeting held on January 27th, was well attended. Presentations were made by: Washington Budget and Policy, NW Health Law Advocates, LGBTQ Commission, Nancy Sapiro (AAUW advocate), and a panel review of our bills of interest and priorities.



Following Lobby Day, Judy scheduled meetings with the 10th District Legislators: Senator Ron Muzzall, Representative Shavers and Representative Paul. These 15-minute-long calls were attended by branch members. Prior to meeting with the legislators a list of Talking Points was compiled to make the most of the time provided.

Both Representative Shavers and Representative Paul are supportive of the bills that AAUW Washington favors. Representative Shavers was thanked for sponsoring the expanded Sexual Assault Nurse Providers bill. Representative Paul expressed the tiring nature of this session with such emphasis on the budget shortfall.

At the national level, AAUW is making our positions on public education clear to our new Secretary of Education. They are working to maintain Title IX.



Intense, recurring thoughts (obsessions) cause a lot of anxiety even though they don't make logical sense. Compulsions (actions) are more than just



double checking something and become a ritual that feels impossible to control. The brain gets stuck in a loop of doubt and fear. People with OCD often excel in detail, precision, and a drive to finish tasks.

The Heaven and Earth Grocery Store by James McBride

"In 1972, when workers in Pottstown, Pennsylvania, were digging the foundations for a new development, the last thing they expected to find was a skeleton at the bottom of a well. Who the skeleton was and how it got there were two of the long-held secrets kept by the residents of Chicken Hill, the dilapidated neighborhood where immigrant Jews and African Americans lived side by side and shared ambitions and sorrows. Chicken Hill was where Moshe and Chona Ludlow lived when Moshe integrated his theater and where Chona ran the Heaven & Earth Grocery Store. When the state came looking for a deaf boy to institutionalize him, it was Chona and Nate Timblin, the Black janitor at Moshe's theater and the unofficial leader of the Black community on Chicken Hill, who worked together to keep the boy safe. As these characters' stories overlap and deepen, it becomes clear how much the people who live on the margins of white, Christian America struggle and what they must do to survive."

Secretary: Linda Lynn presented the January 9, 2025 minutes for approval as printed in the February newsletter. Jackie DeFazio moved to approve, Kathy Cunningham seconded; the motion passed.

Treasurer: Robin Hanks reported income for January was \$3,340.00 from SCAF for money raised from SC Give, \$10.00 for wine glasses, a \$100.00 donation and a \$500.00 donation in memory of Doris Taylor, branch dues of \$24.00 for Wanda Hill and interest of \$16.34 for the Money Market Account.
